ST. DUNSTAN HAPPENINGS

All of our summer falls into the liturgical season of Pentecost. So what is Pentecost, what is its origin, and what happens during Pentecost?

The following article sheds a bit of information on the topic. It mentions that Pentecost is supposed to be "a time of growth" in our spiritual life. The green colours of the vestments reflect this idea of growth. Hopefully, summer has been a time for all to not only enjoy the sunshine and green growth all around us, but also a time for a bit of rest and relaxation to enjoy and appreciate what we have been given.

The Season of Pentecost

FIRST SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

The Season After Pentecost is that part of the church year when we focus on the parables and teachings of Jesus rather than the events of His life. The name of this season varies widely from church to church—it can be called Kingdomtide, Dominiontide, Ordinary Time or the non-Festival half of the year. In most churches, the general theme of the Bible readings and sermons concerns the church's mission in the world to become like Jesus and make disciples of those who do not yet know Him.

"The Season After Pentecost" begins on the day after <u>Pentecost</u>. In the western Church, it ends on the Saturday before the First Sunday of Advent. The last Sunday of this season is always Christ the King Sunday.

The feast of Pentecost derives from the Hebrew celebration, Shavuot, which was held 50 days after Passover and was associated with the first harvest of grain in the spring. The Jewish holiday, also referred to in the Bible as "the feast of weeks," came to be identified with the revelation on Mt. Sinai when Moses received the Ten Commandments. It may also reflect still older, pagan festivals celebrating the return of life to nature following the "death" of winter. Given the importance of Passover, the Sinai tradition, and the spring harvest festivals to both Jews and early Christians, one begins to understand the significance of Pentecost.

Since this season is meant to be a time of growth in one's spiritual life, the color associated with it is green.

Now we focus on our imitation of the life of Christ in our Christian journey.

I pray this long green season will be one of spiritual growth and nourishment for you and those you love.

IT WAS WITH A FEELING OF REGRET AND LOSS

THAT I ANNOUNCED THE PASSING OF DOREEN EDEN

Doreen Eden was one of those most amazing people who often seemed so mild and gentle, but as you got to know her you soon learned that there was a backbone of faith and commitment that would seriously test the strongest of us.

She cared about people, especially the challenged, the abused, and those who succumbed to habits of alcohol and drugs. There was no limit to the commitments that Doreen would make to support those in need.

Al Anon, Stephen Minister, Women's Abuse Centers: these are just some of the caring roles she filled in her lifetime. Doreen made a difference! So many people were affected by her work with people with addictions - not so much work really but a constant outpouring of caring.

Doreen was that solid rock of faith, but she practiced that faith in a few different church settings - from the Orthodox tradition, moving to the Anglican tradition, and spending time at St. Andrews, St. Dunstan's (where she served as a warden), spending her final years at St. George's. Pastor Paul said that the reason he asked Doreen to serve as a warden, was because she brought the wisdom of an elder. It wasn't a book learning, but it was a profound wisdom grounded in her oh so strong faith. Pastor Paul led her service of remembrance and he closed with these words, which I find very appropriate.

"One of my favourite funeral prayers is in our Anglican prayer book. It says: 'We pray that nothing good in this *woman's* life will be lost, but will be of benefit to the world; that all that was important to *her* will be respected by those who follow; and that everything in which *she* was great will continue to mean much to us now that *she* is dead.' And so, even as we mourn the loss of such a special person, we give thanks for the life that she led, for the difference that she made. And perhaps we can all honour her memory by carrying on the work that she did so faithfully during her life.

In other words, may we love each other as much as she loved us."

MEET THE ELLIOTS

This interview was so much fun, as both Ian and Greta are gifted with delightful senses of humour, and rather than interrupting each other (as many of us do when recalling past events), they just seemed to thoroughly enjoy what the other had to say.

Ian was born in Winnipeg, and grew up in Virden, a small Manitoba town close to the Saskatchewan border. After graduating from high school, he enrolled in computer programming classes, graduating with a diploma as a Computer Programmer and Systems Analyst but only to find there were no jobs available. He worked in a warehouse for about eight months, until he was offered an apprenticeship as a funeral director in May of 1978. He apprenticed in this profession in Moosomin, Saskatchewan obtaining his licence in 1981 and worked there for seven years.

Greta was born in High Prairie, and started her life in Peace River country. Her dad was an Anglican minister, so the family moved many times. Alberta, BC, and Saskatchewan were all part of her growing up years. After she graduated from high school, she took an interior design course (evident in her gift and passion for liturgical arts), and then went to business school in Regina. She was hired by the Royal Bank, where she worked for 20 years in Regina, Calgary, Vancouver and Aldergrove.

After leaving the bank Greta started working as a receptionist/scheduler at Jackman Manor. Greta left Jackman Manor after 2 years and started working at Morgan Place Care Facility in south Surrey, as a receptionist/scheduler. Along with her main responsibility of greeting visitors and families she also looks after balancing resident trust accounts and taking families, of prospective new residents, on a tour of the facility. Greta has spent the last 17 years at Morgan Place. She enjoys the interaction with the residents and families.

lan in the meantime had moved to Regina in 1985, and frequently worked with Greta's dad who was the incumbent at one of the churches there. Aha, you say. Yes, fate did decide it was indeed time. Greta had driven out to Regina for Christmas from Calgary. She arrived home in time to pick her mother up after midnight mass, where lan met Greta for the first time. Not during coffee time, not in the after-church line, but in the parking lot. Ian says he looked, saw this dazzling light, said to himself WOW, and was smitten. (His words.)

The next few months were spent travelling back and forth between Calgary and Regina on weekends and holidays, and amassing <u>enormous</u> phone bills (it was nothing to be on the phone for 3 hours or longer). They settled in Vancouver where they lived for 2 years, then moved to White Rock, as Ian continued in management for the Loewen Group.
