Today's Scripture

Genesis 2: This second parable or tradition about creation addresses God's lordship & human obedience, & particularly human temptation, all of which is seen as the 'Fall of Humanity.'

Romans 5: The language & imagery in this reading may be rather challenging to follow. Paul talks of the origin of sin in Adam, & the free gift of forgiveness & hope in Jesus.

Matthew 4: Jesus is single-minded in his mission to humanity despite the attractions of finding easier ways to achieve his hopes.

Sermon Notes

Can anything grow in a desert?

Of course it can. We all have seen beautiful pictures of deserts following a spring rain. Our spiritual ancestors lived in close proximity to the desert. They knew both the intense scarcity & the surprising fecundity of these ecosystems. They saw in deserts a helpful metaphor for the human condition.

In Genesis we read about the beautiful garden where God's children lived in abundance. There Adam & Eve ate a forbidden fruit & their eyes were opened. In Matthew, the Garden is long gone. Jesus is led into the desert by the Holy Spirit & there is presented with temptations by the devil. How far we have come from the garden.

As we follow Jesus into the desert \mathcal{O} witness his temptation, we see our own struggles laid bare.

<u>Weekly P</u>rayer

The following is a resource to help you connect with Sunday's theme & continue your prayers through the week. This can be done on your own or in the family group. This liturgy is based on Home Prayers found in the Book of Alternative Services (p. 687). If you do not have a prayer book, please take & keep one for your use.

The theme for this year's Lenten season comes from the Gospel according to John chapter 20. In this famous account of the resurrection of Jesus, Mary Magdalene stands at the tomb weeping. While she mourns Jesus comes to her & asks, "Why are you weeping? Who are you looking for?" Mary supposed Jesus to be the **gardener** & asks where they have placed Jesus. **Jesus the Gardener** will guide us through the desert of Lent until we see him face to face in the **garden** of resurrection. **This week we wonder about Gardening in the Desert.**

1. The Preparation

A candle is lit as someone prays,

Almighty God, Whose Son fasted forty days in the wilderness, \mathcal{O} was tempted as we are but did not sin, give us grace to discipline ourselves in submission to our spirit, that as you know our weakness, so we may know your power to save; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who is alive \mathcal{O} reigns with you \mathcal{O} the Holy Spirit, one God, now \mathcal{O} for ever. Amen.

2. The Reading & Reflection

Read the passage from Scripture then reflect using the wonder questions as your guide. This guide uses the New Revised Standard Version.

GENESIS 2:15-17; 3:1-7 - WHAT HAPPENED TO THE GARDEN?

Notes on the reading:

- The first part of our reading from Genesis concludes the account of the great Garden of Eden which God planted. In this garden was everything that was needed for life to succeed & grow. Chapter 3 is the beginning of the story of how humanity was exiled from the garden into the wilderness of life.
- The serpent is an ancient symbol of death. Desert dwellers knew how dangerous snakes were because they were able to inflict so much damage without being noticed until it was too late.
- The serpent lies to humanity by suggesting God is keeping good things away from them. The lie is that humanity will never be able to enjoy the good things of life unless they rise beyond themselves & become like God.
- Instead of becoming like God, however, humanity's eyes are opened & they realize how "naked" or unlike God they are. From now on humanity does whatever it can to disguise their humanness while they attempt to cross the desert of life on their own, doing whatever it takes to suceed.

I wonder how you feel about snakes.

I wonder what sort of things are more dangerous than they first appear to be. I wonder how you disguise yourself from God or from others in your life.

I wonder how you try to make it through life on your own.

MATTHEW 4: I-II - CAN ANYTHING SURVIVE THE DESERT OF LIFE?

Notes on the reading:

- The Gospel for this past Sunday is the famous story of Jesus in the desert. The desert is the symbolic (& literal) place of scarcity & meanness. It is the place of brutal honesty & dependency on God.
- While yesterday's reading might suggest that we threw ourselves out into the desert of life by our grasping & pride, the Gospel is clear that it is the Spirit of God that leads Jesus into the desert (v. 1). Deserts are necessary locations of spiritual growth.
- S Fasting (v. 2) is a way to remember our life is dependent upon God, not material things.
- The last line of the story is another reminder that deserts are not places where people are abandoned by God.

I wonder if you have ever experienced a desert moment in your life.

I wonder if you know someone who is experiencing a desert moment.

I wonder how you met God or were ministered by angels in your desert.

I wonder how you can be a ministering angel to someone who is in a desert.

ROMANS 5:12-19 - THE FREE GIFT OF NEW LIFE

Notes on the reading:

- C3 Last Sunday's second reading comes from Paul's great letter to the Romans. In this letter Paul presents his teaching on Christ & his relationship to Moses' Law. His thesis is that anyone can receive God's free gift of life by simply connecting with Jesus, rather than having to adhere to the Law first.
- ☑ Be kind to yourself as you read this very confusing passage from Romans. The greatest of scholars ❖ translators wrestle with the logic ❖ meaning of Paul's words.
- Paul takes the story of the Garden of Eden, particularly the life of Adam & compares it with the life of Jesus.
- There are two different Greek words translated as "Free Gift" (v. 15-17). One is Charisma, the other is Dorea. Charisma is related to the Greek word Charis which means Grace. Dorea is something that has been given. The translators put in the modifier "Free" to emphasize that nature of the Giver of the gift. God does not give gifts out of need, compulsion or debt, but simply out of God's own generous nature.
- Grace is the gift of God which is the foundational gift of life, being, goodness, justice, etc. Grace is like spiritual air. Without grace there is no life. Even though humanity is under the "sentence of death", God has not abandoned us, but made a way for us to be aware, breathe "receive the gift of life."

I wonder if you have ever received a gift \mathcal{O} felt the need to give a gift in return.

I wonder if you have ever received a "Free" gift.

I wonder how Jesus has given you life.

I wonder how Jesus turned the human situation around with the free gift of his life.

PSALM 32 – THE SONG OF THE FORGIVEN

Notes on the reading:

- This psalm is a beautiful reflection on the psychological & spiritual impact of admitting our need for healing & forgiveness.
- The word we translate as Happy (v. 1) is Esher in the Hebrew which is translated as Makarios in the Greek. Makarios is the same word that begins Jesus' Beatitudes (Blessed are the poor in spirit, etc.). Another translation of these words can be Blessed, Lucky, or Fortunate.
- The God we try to hide ourselves from is the only one who can forgive (v. 5), protect, preserve, & deliver us (v. 7).
- ☑ Joy (v. 11) comes from our willingness to admit the deserts of our lives. Confession is an ancient spiritual practice that brings about our personal spiritual healing ⋄ growth.

I wonder if you ever felt lucky (blessed) that you could share your pain or need of healing. I wonder if you have felt the sadness from keeping a secret.

I wonder how you can practice confession in your life & therefore find life again.

Isaiah 35 – God can plant a Garden even in the Desert

Notes on the reading:

- The extra reading chosen for this week to help us in our study comes from the great Prophet Isaiah. This reading is usually read in the season of Advent as the early church saw the words of the prophet fulfilled in the birth, death & resurrection of Jesus.
- Usaiah writes at a time of imminent violence & exile by a foreign army. His people were suffering & wondering where God was during it. Isaiah, likely with the exile of humanity from the Garden in Genesis in mind, writes words of hope that the suffering of their present time is not worthy to be compared with the future glory of life that God will bring to God's people.
- Deserts are real. But more real than deserts is the hope of life that comes from the free gift of God, the Gracious author of life.

I wonder if you are on the brink of disaster, exile or suffering.

I wonder if you know someone who is afraid due to their own personal deserts.

I wonder how God has come to you to bring life in your pain \mathcal{C} fear.

I wonder how God has sent you to someone in need & what life you can offer them.

3. Prayers *ċ* the Lord's Prayer

Choose a litary from the Book of Alternative Services (beginning on page 110). The liturgy concludes with the Lord's Prayer.
